Have your say on cycling and walking in Hart!

Encouraging more cycling and walking across Hart has a positive impact on health and wellbeing as well as environmental benefits from reducing cars on the road. Because of these clear benefits, it is a key priority for us in the coming years.

We'd like as many people as possible to share their views on our walking and cycling proposals through our draft Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan. This proposes an extensive network of cycle routes across the district together with walking zones for the main residential centres.

Hart's new adult training centre

Farnborough College of Technology and Hart District Council have announced plans to open a new adult training centre at the Civic Offices in Fleet. Hart Professional College will be the only one of its kind in the district, serving residents of the town and surrounding areas from this autumn.

The centre will offer a range of both part and full-time qualifications for adults. Qualifications offered through the government's Lifetime Skills Guarantee will also be available to adult learners who are eligible to study selected courses for free.

Hart is one of the College's main catchment areas, so by making use of the Fleet town centre location it's hoped this will better serve our residents.

for you to comment on the draft plan online and make sure the routes identified meet your needs.

The plan for Hart will identify and prioritise infrastructure improvements and make the case for future funding for active travel networks and developer contributions. It will also be an important evidence base to inform our emerging strategy for a Green Grid, which will link communities across Hart.

We've declared a climate emergency and tackling climate change is central to all our activities. This means we're committed to prioritising the reduction of greenhouse gases.

In light of this, we recently purchased our first two electric vans to replace vehicles that were reaching the end of their life. This is the start of our plan to replace our vehicles with the most carbon-efficient option. Our teams use our cars and vans to work at our countryside sites and car parks.

Making electric vehicle charging points readily available is important to support the growing number on the roads.



Electric vehicle charging points have been installed in our Civic Office car park and we plan to install 36 charge points in more of our car parks as part of our wider plans to improve the charging structure across Hart. Some of these are expected this year.

Tip: 40% of a car's carbon footprint comes from manufacturing and maintenance, so the recommendation is to upgrade to electric only when your car is at the end of its life.

Get to know our climate change team

Hart has a small, passionate team dedicated to tackling the climate emergency. We spoke to our new Sustainability and Climate Change Officer, Liz, about the team.

What are your goals and aims?

We're working on the strategy and delivery of our climate change aim. This is to reduce our own council emissions by 2035 and our district-wide emissions by 2040.

What are you currently working on?

I'm new to the team so one of my main priorities is finalising our action plan for the next three years. There are lots of things in the pipeline but we've been upgrading our vans to electric, working on installing public charge points across Hart and recently engaging our residents with our 'bananas' carbon footprint game!

What are the biggest challenges?

There is so much to do! Nearly everything has a carbon footprint, so it affects everyone, especially our local residents and organisations. The challenge is engaging everyone on that journey.

What are the top things you've done personally to reduce your carbon footprint?

I love finding pre-loved clothes and furniture and encourage my children to buy second-hand bargains with their birthday money as they get a lot more toys that way. They really enjoy hunting out bargains! I don't eat meat or dairy, choose local walks for family days out and have also dedicated an area of my garden to a wild native lawn - an easy way to add colour, variety and encourage wildlife for the children to explore.

Do you have any advice for our community?

My advice is to focus on things within your power to change, such as your own carbon footprint. For the biggest impact, focus on how you can modify your heating and insulation, choose a green energy supplier, look at local holidays over long car and plane trips and try to eat a little less meat and dairy.

It's not about doing everything, but trying to do what's realistic for you will go a long way.

Keeping the lights on with solar power

We've taken a big step towards our climate change commitments and installed solar panels on the roof of our offices in Fleet.

We hope these will generate as much as 57,000kWh of electricity a year – the equivalent of powering 20 average homes. This will save a huge 11.5 tonnes of CO2, the equivalent of over 11 hot air balloons of greenhouse gases, from the atmosphere each year.

While moving forward with our climate change commitments, we also want to ensure value for money with the changes we make. The pay-back on investment could be in as little as seven to ten years. From the start excess electricity will be sold back to the grid, providing a small income that will help reduce council costs.

Seven 'bananas' things to reduce your carbon footprint

Nearly everything has a carbon footprint – your food, your TV, even walking through an automatic door. That's one of the key messages from the book 'How Bad are Bananas?' by Mike Berners-Lee (2020).

Our aim is to reduce carbon emissions across the district by 2040, and here are some actions you might consider to reduce your personal carbon footprint as well:



- eat more tinned and frozen fruit and vegetables (they've usually been grown 'in season')
- proudly wear your clogs (they've a lower carbon footprint than synthetic and leather shoes)
- Iook after your devices (manufacturing emissions can be HUGE)
- (so it lasts longer)

Know your numbers

Check your blood pressure - this five-minute task could literally save your life. Undiagnosed high blood pressure can lead to strokes and heart attacks, but it's easy to manage if you know about it. Supporting rough sleepers

We often get asked how residents can help individuals sleeping rough.

The first thing to do is tell us. If you're out and about and you see someone who you are concerned about, you can report it to us by:

- telephoning our Housing team during office hours on 01252 774239 or by emailing dutyhomelessness@hart.gov.uk
- · telephoning our out of office hours team on 01252 774477

We're also supported by a CCTV team out of hours that will contact Hart's duty homelessness officer if they receive reports of anyone sleeping out.

If you have real concerns about the welfare and safety of a rough sleeper, you should also inform the police by calling 101.

The top three reasons for homelessness in Hart are:

- asked to leave by friends and family
- · end of assured shorthold tenancy
- domestic violence or harassment

Helping you with the cost of living

We're committed to supporting our residents through the current cost of living crisis. Our website and cost of living bulletin provide current and useful information on a range of areas.

Our cost of living hub on the website has help on paying your bills, debt advice, housing and employment support, as well as details of local food banks and pantries.

How we help

As soon as we learn about a rough sleeper, we work in partnership with other services to make contact and provide support. This may include, where appropriate:

- finding emergency accommodation and other services, such as healthcare, if they need it.
- · helping rough sleepers find somewhere safe to go so we can find out what they need and find them alternative options.



Ukrainian refugees find a safe haven in Hart

For most people starting a new job means setting up your desk and meeting colleagues but for Nikki Jenkins her first day at the Council was very different.

Nikki was immediately tasked with leading on the Homes for Ukraine scheme, helping the hundreds of people who had fled to Hart from Ukraine after the Russian invasion.

She said: "It was very daunting! I knew lots of people were depending on us and we were determined that both hosts and guests got the support they needed. It's hugely rewarding to help."

Nikki and colleagues in the Communities team swung into action to coordinate Hart's response. Hundreds of people across the district had signed up to become sponsors and to date, we've welcomed 257 Ukrainian guests (126 families in total).



I feel I can slow down and catch my breath, safe and happy here in Hart.

Support continues and we now have a dedicated Homes for Ukraine team, helping guests build an independent life in the UK. The team also assists guests looking to move into their own home from host accommodation. One such family is Nataliia and her daughters.

Nataliia comes from Kharkiv, the second-largest city in Ukraine.



Thousands of homes have been destroyed and life for those who remain in the city, such as Nataliia's husband, father and brother, is constantly under threat. Nataliia and her daughters, aged six and 13, arrived nearly a year ago.

"Life was very difficult to start with, especially getting used to a new language. After using a translator for a while, my confidence grew enough to start speaking to others in English, which I'm also now studying.

"My youngest child started her first school in Hart. My older daughter found a new school in a new country hard but has made friends and settled in well. She even recently won 3rd prize in the school maths challenge!"

As well as being proud of her daughters, Nataliia should be proud of her own achievements. Since arriving she's found a job as a cleaner, passed her driving test, and saved up to buy a car. She's now renting privately in Fleet.

Nataliia is extremely grateful for her hosts' kindness towards her and her family. Many individuals, hard-working groups and government bodies have worked together to help our Ukrainian guests experience a new normality in the UK.

Nataliia had always wanted to visit the UK but could not have imagined the events that would lead her to the new life she is building here.

"Of course, I wish I had arrived under different circumstances, but I feel I can finally slow down and catch my breath, knowing that my children are safe and happy here in Hart."

Our sites offer a great variety of activities and amenities ranging from short and long walks, play areas, picnic spots, lakes and ponds, woodlands and heaths and fascinating wildlife. And we even have a celebrated bike track at Edenbrook County Park.

Recycling your small electricals

We're excited to announce that we've started a trial kerbside collection service of small electrical items from some homes in the district.



Unwanted electrical items are one of the fastest growing waste streams in the world and we recognise that not all items are suitable for repair or reuse. By collecting these items we can prevent precious resources being wasted, giving manufacturers access to recycled material.

We'll be rolling this out to all homes over the next six to nine months, giving you the opportunity to recycle items from hairdryers to hand blenders, and kettles to vapes alongside your waste and recycling collections. Keep an eye out for your letter in the post with full details and your start date.

In the meantime, small electricals can be recycled at the banks around the district. Search 'Recycling sites' on our website for locations.

If you do use disposable vapes, these can be recycled in your small electricals collection or in the recycling banks around the district. Please do not put them in your general waste or normal recycling.

Keep it LOOSE

We aim to recycle as much of what we collect in your blue bins as possible. However, when non-recyclable items are placed in them, or the contents bagged, they cannot be sorted and are treated as general waste.

Nearly a guarter of the waste in blue bins either can't be recycled or is in bags.

To give your recyclables the best chance of ending up as something new please put them in your blue bin loose.

You can currently recycle:

- paper (not shredded) aerosols
- card (not shredded) plastic bottles (no other plastics
- tins

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Cut waste with reusable vapes

If you choose to vape, swapping to reusable units from disposable vapes helps reduce the risk of dangerous fires and the amount of waste generated.



Over 1.3 million disposable vapes are thrown away every week, making them a fast-growing new source of waste to get rid of. As their popularity booms, urgent action needs to be taken around their disposal.

Disposable vapes contain lithium-ion batteries, which easily catch fire if broken. These can lead to dangerous fires on waste collection vehicles, in waste treatment facilities and in our open environment.

Producing lithium also requires a huge amount of energy and water, making it a much less sustainable energy option than the reusable options.

We want everyone to be able to easily recycle as much as possible, so we're working to increase what you're able to recycle in your home collections. We're thrilled to be able to start the trial of kerbside collections of small electricals, allowing these broken items to be turned into something new.

At your convenience

We may not talk about it much, but for many the location of the nearest loo is essential knowledge.



For some people, lack of information on toilet locations causes unnecessary stress and worry and could make them reluctant to leave home. Older age, health conditions or being with young children can all increase the need for access to facilities.

We'd like this information to be easily available, so our Communities team has been working with town and parish councils to map all public toilets in Hart. We've added this information to www.toiletmap.org.uk. Type in a town name or postcode to see the nearest toilets. This works for other locations as well, not just Hart, so wherever you are you can quickly find the nearest public toilets.

In most cases there are also details such as opening hours, baby change and accessible toilet availability.

If you know of any other public toilets in Hart, you can also add them to **toiletmap.org.uk**, or email **hereforhart@hart.gov.uk** with details and we'd be happy to add them for you.

Think Water Safe

Staying safe in the water is always a concern and, tragically, drowning accidents are always high in the summer months. Enjoy the water safely and follow water safety advice.

- Look out for lifeguards! Tempting as some of our water in the district may look, please only swim in designated, and ideally lifeguarded, areas.
- It's colder than it looks. Water at open and inland sites is often much colder than it seems. This can affect your ability to swim and save yourself.
- It's stronger than it looks. Currents can be very strong. If in a current, don't fight it and tire yourself out. Stay calm, swim with it and call for help.
- Bring a friend. Never enter the water alone.
- Remember float to live. If you get into difficulty, stay calm and float on your back instead of trying to swim.

Are your electoral register details correct?

We want to make sure everyone who is eligible to vote in Hart can. Therefore, each year our Elections team checks the electoral register is correct for your household and updates it if needed.

This annual update to the electoral register is a big job, and the team starts contacting all households at the end of July to check the details we hold. You might also hear this referred to as the annual canvass.

Before we contact you, we match the data we hold against the Department for Work and Pensions. If this matches and we have an email address for someone at your property, we will have sent you an email in July.

What happens next?

What action you need to take depends on if the data we hold matches with the Department for Work and Pensions and if we have an email address for someone in your household.

If your data does match:

- You'll have received an email if we have an email address for you. Please reply – just one member of your household can reply for the property. If you reply, we won't need to send you any further communication.
- If you don't respond to the email, or we don't have an email address, we'll send you a letter checking your details. You only need to reply to this if you need to make a change.

If we can't match your data:

- You won't receive an email but will receive a letter that you need to respond to, even if nothing has changed. This will be explained clearly in the letter.
- If you don't respond to this letter, you'll get a reminder letter in early September.
- If you don't respond to the reminder, we will either call or visit your property towards the end of September / early October.

Please look out for your email or letter and follow the instructions provided to make sure you don't lose your right to vote.

Moved house?

If you've moved since the last annual electoral register update, you'll need to re-register to vote at your new address, otherwise you won't be able to vote in future elections. It's up to you to make sure you are registered and on the electoral register.

You'll need to provide further information including your National Insurance number, even if you've moved within Hart. The quickest way to do this is by going online to www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.
