Empowering Young Minds: Think Safe 2025 Returns

Hart District Council is proud to announce the return of the Think Safe event in 2025, an initiative aimed at educating and empowering Year 6 students across the district. This year's program is set to engage over 500 students, providing them with essential knowledge and skills to navigate various safety challenges in their daily lives.

What is Think Safe?

Think Safe is an interactive educational event designed to teach children about personal safety and well-being. Through a series of engaging workshops and activities, students learn about different topics presented by lots of different agencies:

What is Spiking?

Spiking is when alcohol or drugs are added to your drink without your knowledge. It can happen to anyone, and the effects can be serious.


Stay Alert:

- Never leave drinks unattended
- Avoid accepting drinks from strangers
- Stick with friends and look out for each other
- Use drink stoppers or lids when available
- If you feel strange or overly drunk, seek help immediately

Know the Signs:

Confusion, dizziness, memory loss, and feeling more drunk than expected can all be signs of spiking.

If you or someone else may have been spiked, tell venue staff, call 999, or go to A&E.



Tackling Anti-Social Behaviour in Hart

As the evenings get lighter and the weather improves, we often see a rise in reports of anti-social behaviour (ASB) across our parks, open spaces, and town centres. ASB can include things like vandalism, littering, public drunkenness, intimidating behaviour, and noise disturbances. While often seen as 'low-level' crime, it can have a serious impact on residents' quality of life and community wellbeing.

- If you witness or experience ASB, report it to Hart District Council or the police via 101 (or 999 in an emergency).
- Encourage young people to use local youth services and spaces responsibly.
- Speak up—reporting helps us target hotspots and take appropriate action.

We're working closely with local police and community groups to respond swiftly and supportively to ASB concerns. Let's all play our part in keeping Hart a safe, welcoming place for everyone. For more information or to report ASB, you can do so here.
